They warmly welcomed Tunis consigners, buyers and friends to the sale and arranged for Tunis friends to gather for a buffet on Saturday evening and a silent auction on sale day. The fellowship was great and the sale was strong. Congratulations to Jozi Best, Best Tunis, Litchfield, Ohio; she consigned the Champion Tunis Ewe and Champion Tunis Ram which both sold to Heidi Meyers, Millbrook, NY for \$500 and \$775 respectively; the Reserve Champion Ewe, also a Best Tunis yearling, went to Heidi Meyers for \$525. The National Tunis Sale was held at the Empire Spring Classic, Cobleskill, NY and once again a Tunis went Supreme! The Supreme Champion Ewe in the sale was the yearling ewe consigned by Dwight Barney, Woolmark Farm, Lee, NH. She was the high selling ewe in the sale going to Erik Meyers, Millbrook, NY, for \$750. The Tunis Yearling Ram consignment was a strong one. The Champion Ram, the consignment of S&T Tunis, Attica, NY sold to David Bradshaw for \$300. Dwight Barney picked up a yearling ram for \$350, consigned by RQL Farms of Hillsborough, New Jersey. Jennifer Grim, Miller's Maryland, got a Sonshine Acres yearling ram from Walter Clark of Meadville, PA for \$325 and Georgina Anderson, Hustonville, Kentucky took a Richard Feasley ram home for \$325. Nancy Schmidt, Collins, Ohio bought the first place junior ram lamb for \$275 the consignment of Bob Bartholomew, B-Bar Stock Farm, E. Chatham, NY. Fingerlakes Farm's junior ram lamb sold to Jennifer Grim for \$225. A strong yearling ewe consigned by Fingerlakes Farm, Seneca, NY went to Mom's for \$575. Youth purchasing Tunis sheep at the Great Lakes Sheep and Wool Festival and the Empire Spring Classic had their names entered in a drawing; the youth whose name was drawn received \$50 toward the purchase price of their animal. The National Tunis Sheep Registry provided the cash incentives. This will be done at the Rhinebeck Bred Ewe Sale in October as well.

The National Tunis Sheep Registry, Inc. Board of Directors met during the weekend of the National Tunis Sale. Locations for various national events were finalized. The 2003 and 2004 National Tunis Sale will be held in Wooster, Ohio, in conjunction with the Great Lakes Sheep Show and Sale. The 2002, 2003 and 2004 National Tunis Show will be held at Eastern States Exposition, West Springfield, Massachusetts. The 2002 and 2003 National Tunis Junior Show will be held in conjunction with the North East Youth Show held annually during the New England Sheep and Wool Growers Show and Sale in West Springfield, MA in July.

Look for the Annual Meeting of the National Tunis Sheep Registry, Inc. following the National Tunis Show at Eastern States Exposition on Saturday, September 21, 2002. The meeting will be held at a local restaurant.

### **TUNIS YOUTH INFORMATION....**

**NATIONAL TUNIS YOUTH SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION....**The NTSRI awards a scholarship each year to a current college student under the age of 22 who is either a member of the club or whose parents are members of the club. If you have just graduated from high school or are currently enrolled in college and are interested in applying...please ask your district director for a complete application. All applications must be received by Sept. 1st as the scholarship will be awarded at the Eastern States show in September.

**NATIONAL TUNIS YOUTH REPRESENTATIVE.....**This position is responsible for attending as many of the National Registry functions as possible and to promote the Tunis breed in general. If you or your parents are members of the NTSRI and you are currently less than 19 years of age.....you may qualify for this position. You may obtain the application from your district director and the applications must be returned by Sept. 1st. This honorary position allows for the representative to showcase his/her talents and the Tunis sheep. Get those applications completed!

## **DIRECTOR OF REGION 5....Don Schrider writes.....**

Hello there! Wow! What a meeting the Board of Directors had in Cobleskill. Many topics were discussed and many ideas were shared. I think that this was one of the most productive meetings we have had since I joined the Board. You could tell that while not everyone agreed on every issue, each idea came from someone who cared about the good of our club. I left the meeting feeling very good about what had transpired, and proud that each of the members attending the meeting had the courage to honestly state their positions. With fine people like this, I know our club is special!

I'm sure you will get a full report in this newsletter, but let me mention a few highlights. First the Board is looking into raising our rates. The question became whether to raise the membership fee or the registration and transfer fees. We will need the money in the near future to promote our breed in larger and more exciting ways. Currently we have the lowest registration and transfer fees in the industry. And we now have a five-generation pedigree printed right on the registration papers (way to go Judy Harris). Personally I feel and increase in the membership fee would be wrong and unfair to those that raise a small number of animals or no animals. I think that registration papers add purebred value to the sheep and our increasing costs (postage and promotions) should be borne by the animals. If you live in Region 5, write or call me right away with your viewpoint so that I know what my membership thinks. If you have unregistered animals get them registered this year and save yourself some money (the new rates begin January 1, 2003).

Next, I am very excited to announce that the 2003 National Tunis Sale will be moving to Ohio! This is a great stroke of promotion of our wonderful sheep, as Ohio's location will allow more people access to some of the finest sheep around. By moving to Ohio, we are still within a driving distance for many of the breeders, and now closer to potential buyers (and maybe new members) who could not drive all the way to New York. Tunis have done well in the Northeast. Now we will make them more available to the Midwest and to the South. If you've been looking for quality Tunis, but felt it was too far to our National, meet us halfway in Ohio (watch this newsletter for details).

The Shows/Stipends Committee has done a wonderful job of spreading around some specials and working within their budget. If you want to see specials offered at a show near you, just contact this committee and they will give a fair consideration to your request. After all, promoting Tunis helps all of us and is the reason we have a club. At the meeting some ideas were expressed to further use this committee to promote our wonderful breed of sheep. If you have an idea, now is a good time to get it to your Board representative. Talk included wool promotion awards, carcass contest awards (possibly to include 1/2 blood Tunis), and a special program suggested by a member (I think I better wait to tell you about this one). We have not voted on any of these as of yet. Your support of these initiatives or your suggestions for other promotions could impact the final budget for this committee - so make your opinions known now!

Summer is here at Long Corner. Our lambs are growing very well this year. We wormed a little more often, at Louise Dunham's suggestion. And we fertilized our pastures for the first time in eight years. I do need to get out and brush off the pastures, but with my ankle still healing, I cannot stand the vibrations of the tractor - it will just have to wait. We were very satisfied with the results of our breeding program and the color our young ram, Samson, put on his offspring. I also think I produced a great ram lamb from our old ram Albert. I plan to save "Niles" until next spring, and then I will decide whether to keep him or sell him. We sold a lot of sheep this year (for us) and have been giving inquiries the names of other breeders. Next year we plan to breed from only seven ewes while holding over three ewe lambs. I hope your summer and fall are great! Best Wishes,

## NTSR, INC. BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING MINUTES....May 31, 2002

The meeting was called to order at 1:10 pm by President, Dwight Barney (Region 1). Directors present were Joe Seavey (Region 4), Randy Powley (Region 6), Don Schrider (Region 5), Virginia Lavin (Region 3), Gary Grenier (Region 2), Nancy Schmidt (alternate Region 7), Peter Harris (Proxy for Don Mayes, Region 8) and Judy Harris (Clerk). Also in attendance were members Bob Bartholomew, Julie Jones, Mimi Asbornsen, Jozi Best and David and Sandra Rock.

President Barney welcomed all. He mentioned that he has had lots of request for Tunis sheep this year, and that he hoped the interest would continue. He then asked for a volunteer to take the minutes. Nancy Schmidt volunteered. The minutes from the last meeting were not read, as the Secretary was not present.

Treasurer Gary Grenier gave the Treasurer's report. Current balance is \$4,209.79. Judy Harris then gave the Clerk's report. The new computer system and programs are installed and working. Total cost was \$2,498.95, which included set-up and assistance getting programs running. Judy passed out an updated membership list and the summary of income and expenses. She mentioned that Regions 1, 2, 3, & 7 are growing. Judy showed examples of the new registry certificate containing a 5 generation pedigree, and the envelopes used to mail them. Information in the new computer goes back to 1995 and includes animals with registry numbers 9106 and above. When a pedigree is requested for anything before that, they will be charged extra for the research required.

Joe Seavey reported on the Youth program. The jacket for the Youth Representative had not yet arrived. Joe said he would look into this. Gary Grenier reported that the new web site is up and running, and that we are looking for someone who can keep the site updated. No report on Historical papers as Historian was not present.

Peter Harris gave a report on the Show/Stipends committee. The Board had authorized spending up to \$1250 for this year. Funds had been allocated as follows:

Harrisburg Youth Show - \$200

Northeast Youth Show \$200      Ohio State Fair - \$200      Sussex County, NJ - \$200

In addition, youth present and purchasing Tunis at the Great Lakes Sheep and Wool Festival, Empire State, NE Sale, and Rhinebeck Bred Ewe Sale will have names entered in a drawing. One winner from each of the four sales will receive \$50 towards the purchase price of the sheep they bought.

Ethics Committee Chair, Mimi Asbornsen, gave a report. The committee unanimously agreed that in disputes between buyers and sellers, the registry is only a registry and not a policeman.

Next, Nancy brought up the need for more articles for the newsletter. Joe offered that anyone could and should submit articles. It was acknowledged that Louise works very hard at obtaining articles, but further support by all club members is needed. Clarification of the club's policy of paying the newsletter editor was brought up. Currently the club makes one annual payment. Dwight offered to talk to Louise about this. Don suggested a box be included in the newsletter that contains information on how to advertise on the web site and in the newsletter, and that the rates be included.

Don Schrider, Election Chairman, then made a report of the election results. Bob Bartholomew was elected director of Region 3 with Julie Jones elected as his alternate by write-in votes. Gary Grenier was re-elected in Region 2 with Peter Harris elected as his alternate, again by write-in votes. It was suggested that in future elections lists of eligible members of the Region be included when nominations are sent out. The next election will be in 2003 for Regions 1, 4 & 8.

President Barney then asked for New Business. Several things were discussed. Motions and voting were postponed until the new officers took office. With the new directors now taking office, President Barney called for Elections of Club Officers. Gary made a motion to keep the slate of Officers the same. Peter Harris seconded it. All approved.

The budget for 2002-2003 was then discussed. Questions were asked in regard to expenditures for the newsletter, Registry, Shows, Salaries and Miscellaneous expenses. That information was not on hand. Bob Bartholomew made a motion to have a financial report in the next newsletter. Peter Harris requested a budget increase for the Show/Stipend Committee based on projected need in the future. The Board tabled the request for now. Judy Harris suggested an increase in the cost of registration and transfers to cover the rising costs of postage and printing. Several ideas were discussed on how much of an increase to make for registration and transfers, and whether the increase should come from an increase in membership fees. It was decided to give the membership a chance to voice their opinions by including proposals in the newsletter. A final vote will be made at the next Board Meeting at the Big E, and the new costs will become effective January 1, 2003. All approved. A budget committee of Joe, Judy and Gary was appointed. They are to make further recommendations for the September meeting.

Judy suggested that the club should have a generic stationary and envelopes for Directors and Officials of the NTSRI to use. What we have is out of date. It was suggested that the new letterhead not include current officers on the printing so that it could be used for some years. Bob moved to authorize Judy spending up to \$300 to purchase the above. Gary seconded it. All approved.

The National Show and Sale was discussed. Don Schrider made a motion to move the National Sale to the Great Lakes Sheep and Wool Show/Sale in Wooster, Ohio for the years 2003-2004. Nancy seconded it. For: Dwight, Gary, Randy, Don, Bob, Peter & Nancy. Against: Joe. Approved.

## MINUTES CONTINUED....

Gary made a motion to commit to three years (2002, 2003, & 2004) to the Big E for the National Show and to look for a new location for 2005. Joe seconded. For: Dwight, Gary, Randy, Don, Peter & Joe. Against: Bob & Nancy. Approved.

Joe moved that the National Youth Show be at the New England Sale in July for the years 2002 & 2003. Bob seconded it. All approved.

Lyle Hotis had sent in an idea on having a National Tunis Shepherd Award. Joe moved that a committee be formed to work out the details. Nancy seconded it. All approved. The issue of Scrapie was brought up and discussion on the various eradication programs ensued. The consensus was to see what happens down the road.

Don called for an annual membership meeting to be held in conjunction with the National Show. Dwight said there will be one and that it will be held at B'Shara's Restaurant. Date and time to be posted in newsletter.

Discussion followed about having someone officially write articles for magazines and news releases. Dwight had someone in mind and was going to approach them about filling this need.

Randy moved that the meeting be adjourned. Nancy seconded it. All approved.

Featuring Sarah Carter of Seymour, Iowa and Curly!

## **CURLY SUE MAKES HER DEBUT:**

"Curly Sue's relatives came to the United States from Africa in 1799, but she doesn't care. Some of her ancestors were even called 'fat tails', but that doesn't bother her, either. Curly Sue is an American Tunis ewe lamb and the first one of her breed to be exhibited at the Wayne County Fair.

Sarah Carter, Walnut Monroe Lone Tree 4-H, was the trendsetter who broke the breed barrier by bringing her plush woolen sheep to the fair. The lamb attracted attention by being a soft yellow/amber color.

The U.S has always been the 'melting pot' of the world, and Curly Sue's family were intermingled with some European breeds for improved meat characteristics. She is registered and came to Sarah by way of the Humeston Sale Barn. A small flock was presented for sale and the first buyer took his choice for 'weed eaters.' Sarah's parents, Lisa and Rich Carter, were therer and they bought the remaining seven ewes.

Curly Sue was born March 1, an additional purebred class was added to the fair book and she made a trip to the Wayne County Fair....

Information on the American Tunis says the breed is 'alert and their eyes as well as ears convey intelligence and grace.' The Carters would agree with that description. Sarah, 16, has been showing sheep for five years, saying that Curly Sue is 'different', but she enjoys having different things in the barn.

'They are nice, they all are,' she said. 'They're easier to get along with than Suffolks. They're flighty if left alone but they sure are easy to tame.'

Usually Lisa takes care of the middle-of-the-night deliveries but occasionally she rousts everybody out of bed to help rub down newborns delivered in the snow. Sarah says she helps whenever she's needed, but so do her sister and brother, Samantha and Seth. The Carters say that Tunis ewes are good little mothers. Last lambing season one who unfortunately lost her lamb took on twins from another ewe who was ill. The foster mother was a first-time mom, but she raised them just fine.

The American Tunis sheep are known for their disease resistance and their ability to remain productive on marginal land. When crossbred, they produce premium lambs for the hot house/ethnic market on the eastern seaboard. However, in southern Iowa, there is not much of an ethnic market, so the wool would be the logical by-product to sell. Tunis wool is a lustrous 24 to 30 microns, long-stapled four to six inches that has found favor in textile and fiber enterprises. A Tunis ewe will typically sheer a fleece weighing six to nine pounds. The Carters would like to find a market for the Tunis wool locally or at least make a connection to someone who spins and weaves. That way they can see what finished products Curly Sue and her relatives can help produce.

The Carter 4-Hers will probably be back with more entries in the purebred commercial ewe class next year. The former owner of their small flock kept a ram, so they can make use of that purebred and perhaps expand their flock.....There is a Tunis herd at Shelbina, MO so the Carter family plans to take a road trip to visit those sheep. Then they can see how Curly Sue's family measures up to the other sheep of the breed. Regardless of what they see in Missouri, Curly Sue won't care.

In addition to being an active 4-H member and caretaker of the sheep, Sarah plays basketball and softball, is a member of the choir and of the Seymour FFA. She entered projects in visual arts, painting, photography, ag sciences and food and nutrition at the county fair.

Her 4-H entry on ultrasound studies for sheep is a Wayne County entry at the Iowa State Fair. 'They are probably 98 percent accurate', she reported after the study was done. Probably Curly Sue doesn't care about that either."

These clubs charge \$5.00 for registrations: Columbia, Dorset, Katahdin, Montadale, Natural Colored, NC Cheviot, Oxford, Polypay, Rambouillet, Shropshire, Southdown, Suffolk and Texel.

These clubs charge \$6.00 for registrations: Corriedale, Finnsheep, and Hampshire

This club charges \$9.00 for registrations: Icelandic

## MANAGEMENT TIPS.....

**JOE SEAVEY WRITES.....(A LAMBING TIP....)** We give all lambs within 12 hours of being born (usually within 4 hours), two pumps of sheep nutridrench. We feel this gives the lamb a real boost and gets them off to a much better start. For backward or lazy lambs, it seems to stimulate the sucking reflex and makes them more aggressive about nursing. We have been using this for about 6 or 7 years and feel that it allows us to get the ewe and lamb(s) out of the jug a little quicker. We also usually lamb outside and move the ewe and lamb(s) into the barn and a jug after birth. This seems to work better for us than trying to lamb in a jug. It is less stress on the ewe and allows her to pick her birthing spot. This allows for a more natural process ---like nature intended in the first place before humans started tinkering.

**VAL AMESOF ONTARIO, CANADA WRITES....(STATISTICS ABOUT LAMBING PROBLEMS)** I have had Tunis for eleven years now, forming around a third of my total flock, the other breeds being polled Dorset and percentage British Suffolks with a six year spell of St. Croix. also. The breeding ewes, totalling around 110 for all three breeds, are bred to lamb from mid-December to March with yearlings being the last to lamb. They are fed free choice hay outside, under 'greenhouses', and have access to a barn at all times. Most lamb early morning and I do not work the night shift! During my sixteen years with sheep I have kept detailed records during the lambing season and after a conversation with Louise on malpresentations, decided to go back through my records to see if there was a pattern. I found just one ewe, a Tunis, with a history of poor presentations (she was kept as she almost always had triplets) and she passed this on to only one of her ewe lambs. A ram lamb kept from her and used in this flock for six years never passed on any tendency towards difficult lambings. He is working out his retirement on another farm and continues to produce good lambing ewes. I found no correlation between winter weather/time of day/age of dam/number of lambs/sire used, and malpresentations and have concluded that unless I expand my flock to around a thousand for a better data base, almost all malpresentations in my flock are just bad luck!!

On the topic of the current very hot, humid weather, I did notice one startling fact amongst my three sheep breeds, which are still awaiting the shearer unfortunately. The Suffolks do not take this weather at all well, the Dorsets are a little better in coping but the Tunis behave almost the same as if it was winter, often lying out in the sun at midday!! They all have huge amounts of treed shade but the Tunis seem impervious to this heat. With global warming a given, surely a selling feature, amongst many, of this wonderful breed. PLEASE WRITE MORE, VAL!!!!

**BOB BARTHOLOMEW WRITES....(ABOUT OUR BREED STANDARD AND WOOL LENGTH)**....We have been working and fighting for many years to be 'accepted' by the other sheep breeds as a legitimate breed on an equal playing field with the others. I don't see the problem - Tunis are bred and shown as a 'meat' breed of sheep and all of the shows we attend have set guidelines for how breeds will be shown. Usually, meat breeds are to be shown with 'less than 1" of fleece' - what's wrong with that? Why would we want something else? It's taken a while for many breeders of other breeds to take us seriously and I think it would be taking a step backwards to ask shows to change or establish a wool rule just for us. Just because our standard says it should be '1 - 1 & 1/2 inch' doesn't mean that the show world will change for us. If I recall the folks that worked on that standard were not fans of the showring anyway. I think that its time we change the standard and not ask the world to change for us!"

**LOUISE DARLING DUNHAM WRITES....(ABOUT FARM NAMES)**....When you start to use a farm name for advertising, shows and sales...please choose one that really tells who you are. "LOTS OF SHEEP FARM" doesn't tell the new breeders or the people outside of your county...who owns those sheep. Please make sure that your name is appearing as often as the farm name...and maybe you should include your name in the farm name. If you read old newsletters (or sales listings in this newsletter) that list winners by farm names...do you know who won those classes? Those fortunate few Tunis breeders that always win will have name & farm name recognition but the rest of us will be lost over time.
