**ANNARAE HODGIN AWARDED
THE 2013 BRUCE HUNT
"SHEPHERD OF THE YEAR"**

AnnaRae Hodgin of Ramseur, NC was presented with the 2012 Bruce Hunt Shepherd of the Year Award by the Tunis organization at the 2012 North American International Livestock Expo in Louisville, KY. This award was created to honor the memory of Bruce Hunt as he was noted for his positive and continuous promotion of the Tunis breed in a wide variety of ways. The Bruce Hunt Shepherd of the Year Committee has once again chosen an individual in the Tunis world that actively promotes the Tunis sheep and sheep in general. This individual is AnnaRae Hodgin.

AnnaRae has had Tunis for more than 25 years and still runs approximately 200 Tunis ewes and replacement animals on her North Carolina Century Farm which has been in her family for more than 130 years. AnnaRae served as a Director for the National Tunis Sheep Registry for more than 10 years and, in addition held several positions with the organization. Currently, she serves as historian for the national Tunis organization.

AnnaRae has been active in the American Farm Bureau Federation as a ~~member~~ of an advisory committee for sheep and goats, as a member of the NC Farm Bureau's Commodity Advisory Committee on Specialty Livestock, and in her local Randolph County Farm Bureau by serving as a Director and as chairman of the Scholarship Committee. At one time, AnnaRae served as co-chair of the North Carolina Scrapie Board. She has worked closely with the American Livestock Breeds Conservancy serving as a speaker for Heritage Breeds and as a demonstration farm. Her family and farm have continued to educate the public about Tunis and sheep in general by allowing various ag classes to visit their farm.

The Bruce Hunt Shepherd of the Year Committee wishes to encourage AnnaRae Hodgin to continue in the same, positive manner that she has shown for a number of years. Your efforts are very much appreciated.

AnnaRae has had Tunis over 25 years, she is running approx. 200 Tunis, which includes 13 rams, 9 prospective ram lambs, and 12 ewe lambs to be retained, the remainder of her flock are breeding ewes.

Herr NC Century Farm, is recognized by NCDA & CS and NC State Fair. It has been in her family over 100 years and has been farmed by her family for over 130 years, or ever since they gained possession of the land. AnnaRae never tires of promoting Tunis sheep. She has graciously placed her sheep in at least 4 zoos and heritage farms. AnnaRae's sheep could have been seen in these locations.

Brookgreen Gardens in South Carolina is a very fancy place w/ lots of statuary, they wanted Tunis sheep because they thought Tunis had been there at one time, but she could find no proof of their being on their grounds.

The Swiss Village Foundation in Newport, Rhode Island, a preservation of heritage animals.

Hattiesburg, Mississippi Zoo wanted a typical animal from the time that Tunis were around there.

The Nature Science Center: Greensboro, North Carolina becoming a Zoo which has really upset of NC Zoo folks...We see them on TV several times a year when they are running ads as a family place to visit.

My Tunis Story

I raised a 7/8 Dorset flock for several years, running 130 ewes. Henry Kuykendall gave me some old ewes to get me started in cleaning up my farm, especially around the barn and other outbuildings. I attended every ovine class I could locate within driving distance. I even attended classes taught by Libby Henson, curator of a conservancy group in England & Scotland. During this time I saw a poster of sheep breeds in North America, which included the TUNIS. I went on a search for anyone in NC with Tunis. I also contacted NTSRI and Leona Fitzpatrick. She provided information and names of persons with Tunis. Thus I met Dr. David R. Lincicome of Midland, VA. Such a beautiful MAN! I paid several visits to him and Peg over the next 3 years, during which time, he convinced me that I MUST join ALBC (American Livestock Breeds Conservancy. The national office is only about 40 miles from home so I visited the group once or twice a month to read and learn. Sadly, ALBC did not have a lot of info, but I did join. I was also put in touch with Katherine Wilmoth. I purchased my very first Tunis from Katherine. (She served as Region 5's director during the change when directors had been appointed.) I bought a young ram lamb, which became UNO. He was 3 months old! Since I put the ram in with the ewes for 2 months, Uno went also. After all he was just a baby! Imagine my surprise & delight when I found the first of 6 red lambs .Uno!! That did it! I HAD to have Tunis. Uno was a Hunter ram. I soon found an ad for a flock of Tunis for sell nearby...only about 50-60 miles away. The couple with the flock had lost their jobs, but secured other employment several hours from the farm they were using. They had to sell. I got there while the feet were being trimmed.....foot rot odor hit me as I got out of my truck. But, I liked the looks of the girls and made an offer. A week later I was the proud owner of 9 HILLIS ewes, and UNO's half-brother. I learned how to trim feet from Kim and as soon as I got the girls home they were headed for a FOOTTRIM! But first I had to ear tag the girls, as they no longer had tags, but names. These ewes came home with paint stick marking up and down their backs, while I had a piece of paper corresponding to the back marks. The couple had taken the original tags out because "it looked like it hurt." Thus began my ewe flock, with Nebula, Natasha, and Harriett. My next purchase was from Dr. Dave, as I have since learned to call him. Again a flock of 9 ewes; with papers from Red Wing, Tulip Tree Farm, Harris, Hunter, Meiser and Fitzpatrick. A ram came also. He became \$600 worth of burger when he produced white lambs that looked like Dorsets. He also produced mottled lambs (all over, not just the head) with 1 black spot on the right side only! ON EVERY LAMB HE sired. Not one lamb was registered that first year!

Uno's ½ brother (Raphael) did not produce the lambs to the quality of Uno, so he also became freezer meat. I used Uno for several years and then sold him to Blue Ridge Institute, located at Ferrum College in Ferrum, VA. I received a call a few years later learning that the farm had suffered a dog attack, losing the ewes they had, except for Uno, and some other rams. I traded about 10 ewe lambs and received three rams in exchange. They all received names and Robert E. Lee was my pick to use as the first breeder. I liked his lambs and used him until he was slaughtered. Jefferson Davis was sold to a commercial breeder. Jeb Stuart was sold to a research supplier and Stephen D. Ramseur died on the farm.

I had my flock base and closed the flock until purchasing the Kirby- Mende flock in 2006. I disposed of that flock over a 2-year period. And just this year sold anything with the Mende lines, lambs kept from the previous breedings. They simply did not fit into the path I had decided to follow.

In the mean time I became active with the Board and ran to replace Dr. Dave, who had resigned. I served out his term, just over 2 years. I was then elected twice to serve my own 3-year terms. In all this time, I only missed 1 board meeting. Randy Powley replaced me for 6 years. I also participated in several ALBC conferences and community college events. I was program speaker (on Tunis) for the national meeting and served on the panel that discussed selling your endangered animal to other breeders. I think there were 9 or 10 on the panel and EACH one stated that they had refused to sell to someone that didn't meet their innate vision of a "good" prospective owner/tender. Most recently I was the speaker for an event that ALBC developed for Veterans. This was a very interesting group, mostly veterans suffering from PTSD. This group consisted of both men & women. The talk was about 1 1/2 hours long. Also included were other breeders with other animals that also spoke for approximately the same amount of time. The next day the group came to the farm and we were able to do some "hands on" type of instruction. The time was from 9-12 noon, but most of the group stayed until 3-4 pm.

We, JC & I; have had as many as 350 Tunis, but have only about 130 ewes now, that should start delivering lambs any day now. My guess is for Christmas day or the next. As many of my friends know, my health has been not the best for the past two years, and in light of that fact; I have made a decision that has caused me many tearful days and nights. So, if anyone would like to add some traditional, fat-tailed, dark-colored animals...Call me. The flock is for sale, except for a few "pets", like Crook Neck (snake bitten which paralyzed her neck); Baby Girl, and Little Bit.

As for receiving the Bruce Hunt Award, this was such a surprise. But to receive it with my friend and pal, Nancy Schmidt made it even more special. Nancy & I were fortunate enough to know Bruce and Sandy. The fact that Sandy established this award in Bruce's honor after he passed was an indication of the esteem he garnered during his time with the Tunis he loved.

Thank you to the persons responsible for the recognition.

Youth that participate in NTSRI sponsored and funded youth events must also have their sheep registered by NTSRI.

NTSRI will continue to provide the infrastructure to support our members in the US and Canada and our Youth. Please contact your Director if there are any questions.

Friday – Fleeces accepted after 12 noon and before 8 am on Saturday.

Saturday – Judging of fleeces 8-9 am near the Show Arena. Fleeces will be on display after 9 am Saturday through Sunday at 3 pm at Rostraver Farm's booth, Building 13 - spaces 1 & 2.

COMPETITION & PRIZES

There are two classes, "Tunis Ram Fleece" & "Tunis Ewe Fleece," with prizes awarded for each.

RULES & GUIDELINES

Fleeces must be from a registered Tunis sheep - registration numbers are required on the entry card.

Exhibitors need not be members of the NTSRI.

The fleeces must be shorn within the past 12 months of the show date.

The fleeces must be displayed in clear plastic bags and not be tied.

The fleeces should be skirted and free of chaff, burrs, tags & second cuts.

The judge has the right to disqualify any fleece that contains an excessive amount of foreign material.

JUDGING CONSIDERATIONS

- a. The quality of the fleece must be typical of the Tunis breed.
- b. Evenness of quality throughout the fleece is very important.
- c. An appropriate length and strength of staple is required.
- d. Condition and cleanliness of the fleece.
- e. Crimp and color of the fleece.
- f. The estimated clean weight of the fleece.

TO ENTER

Put the following information on a 3 x 5 index card inside an envelope accompanying each fleece entry:

- Owner name, farm name, address, email address, phone number, and \$3 entry fee.
- Ram or Ewe Class, with animal's age and registration number.
- Weight of the fleece and how many months growth represented.
- Disposal Information - Fleeces should be marked whether they are to be sold through a "Private Treaty Sale" at the festival (please price your fleece,) picked up in person, returned to the exhibitor via mail (please include return postage funds,) or if other arrangements have been made.

To ensure adequate display space, please let us know how many entries you will be bringing to the show in person.

Fleeces may also be shipped to Marianne Turcheck, 1574 Rostraver Road, Belle Vernon, PA 15012 and **must** be received by **Friday, May 17th**. Please include a phone number or email address so Marianne can confirm your entries were received.

The Midwest & Beyond Tunis Association is trying to do their part. A fund of \$250.00 to be spent annually, has been established to promote NEW Tunis activities. Individual members or groups can apply for amounts ranging from \$25 to \$100 towards the establishment of a new activity or promotion of the Tunis breed. Some suggestions have been: to order Tunis brochures for a breed display at a petting zoo or fair, add a special Tunis wool class at a Fiberfest or show, provide class money for an additional Tunis class at your local or state fair...slick shorn ewe lamb, offer special premiums for leading a Tunis in a wool lead line event, purchase art supplies for a Tunis breed display at a 4-H or FFA event, place an ad in a newspaper, purchase photo supplies, the 1st bid on a Tunis wether at the 4-H sale. Any of these ideas would be acceptable...what else do you have to suggest? Guidelines: must be a MW&BTA member to apply. (So for a \$20 membership fee...you could get \$100 in return! And there are several benefits to being a MW & BTA member!) No formal application needs to be filled out, just send a simple description of your event and amount that you need. The application needs to be submitted by February 15th, 2013. If your NEW Tunis activity is selected, you will be asked to write a short notice about the event for the newsletter before the event, and a short notice about the success of the event afterward. Each winning project will receive money only one year, as the idea is to try as many NEW promotional ideas to promote Tunis as possible. A committee will notify the award recipients, and the money will be sent to the winners, and those who don't receive an award will be notified by Feb. 25th. Money will be awarded at this time until the entire fund is given out. The yearly \$250 is guaranteed for the next two years and then the program will be revisited by the board before being continued or discontinued.

He is a Vice-President of the Fauquier Feather Friends Four-H Club in Warrenton, Virginia which specializes in chickens and poultry. Omar's mother likes spinning and weaving so Omar took her to the Maryland Sheep and Wool Show in 2010. There he met with a member of the Youth Conservation Program, Mrs. Elaine Ashcraft, who told him of an annual contest where you write an essay to have a chance to win a rare sheep. In 2011 Omar's essay won him a Karakul ewe, but the lamb was not at the Sheep and Wool show. He needed to pick up his lamb at the Ohio Great Lakes Show and sale. While at the show he won a drawing for a discount bid on a Tunis ewe lamb from the NTSRI (Those buyers' credits do pay off!). He had his ewes bred by registered rams of their breed (Thanks to Mom's Tunis of Virginia for "Big Red"!)

Omar found sheep he liked, and that sheep like him. Mrs. Briget, his 4-H leader, supported him with his 4 legged "chicken" project. He attended the BANBURY'S Lamb camp in Danville, Ohio to learn more about showing sheep. In May 2012, he showed his first Tunis in the breed showcase and he also showed his Karakul lambs. From there he had a busy summer, He attended but did not show in the Ohio Great Lakes Sale (He did not want to sell any of his babies). Omar wrote an article on the Karakul breed for the [Banner Magazine](#). He attended and showed in the Mid- West Junior Pre-view in Sedalia, MO. His Tunis ram lambs placed 5th and 6th and his Tunis ewes 3rd and 4th places. Two weeks later he was at the Junior All American; here he met with many of the NTSRI members and learned more about preparing lambs for show. He found that he needed more help to show all the lambs he brought but still did well with 3rd and 4th place March ram lambs and 1st place ram fleece. Last, he attended the North American International Livestock Exposition in Louisville, KY. He met with his friends at the show and learned more on fitting and the skill-a-thon and what the fashionable sheep and owner can wear.

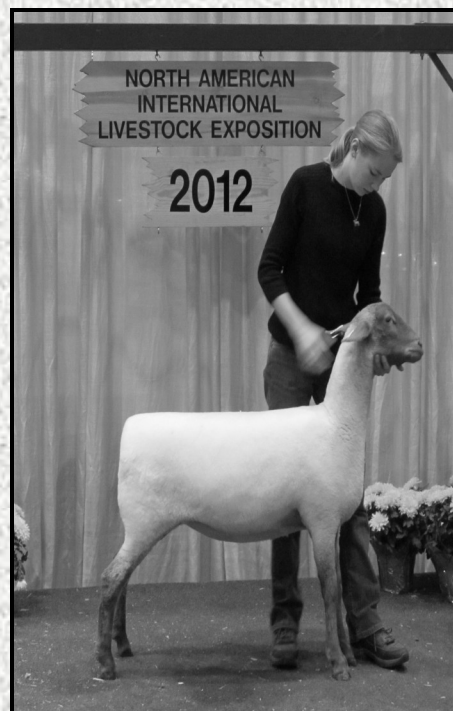

I also cover local agricultural events and news as a freelance writer for the Southern Edition of Lancaster Farming Newspaper.

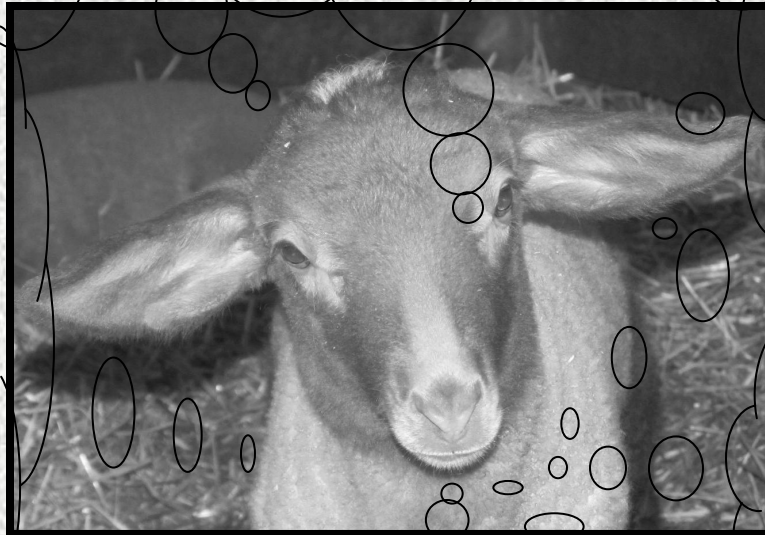

Brown ground lamb in large soup pot. Remove any rendered fat. Stir in lentils, chopped veggies, salt, pepper, bay leaf, bouillon cubes, juice and water. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat to low, cover, and cook for a couple of hours, stirring occasionally. Remove bay leaf before serving; garnish with freshly grated sharp Cheddar cheese.
