DEADLINE TO APPLY FOR TWO NATIONAL TUNIS SHEEP SCHOLARSHIPS IS MAY 15TH APPLY NOW!

NTSRI Scholarship Rules:

NTSRI will award 2 scholarships. One \$1000.00 scholarship will be paid directly to the college in 2/\$500.00 installments. The recipient must submit their first semester grades and a brief summary of college life after the first semester as well as earning a minimum GPA of 2.0 to receive the second \$500.00 installment.

The second award will be a \$500.00 installment paid directly to the college the first semester.

The scholarship is available to any member of NTSRI who is seeking post-secondary education in the fall of 2015. Students must begin college in the fall of 2015 to receive the award.

The recipient may have won the scholarship before, provided that they present the scholarship committee with proof of grades during the time that they received the scholarship.

The applicant or their parent must be a current member of NTSRI, and have been a member in 2014 and have their 2015 dues paid by the application deadline of May 16, 2015. In addition a member must have at least 2 sheep registered with the organization both years to be eligible to receive the scholarship.

A copy of your resume should be included in the application.

The application deadline is May 16, 2015 and will be considered late if received after this date.

The Scholarship selection committee will review the applications and announce the winner(s) in Wooster, Ohio at the National Tunis Show and Sale Breeders and Buyers Dinner, May 24, 2015.

FAREWELL MESSAGE FROM ROBIN SWARTZ, DIRECTOR REGION 2

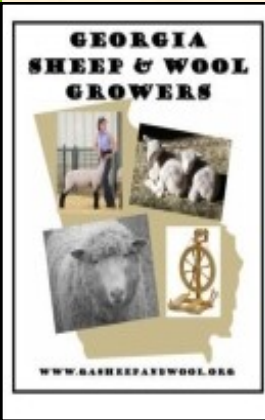
Well this is my last letter as region two director. It has been a pleasure to serve my region and I know going forward my replacement will serve region us well.

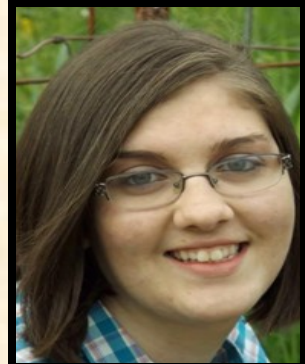

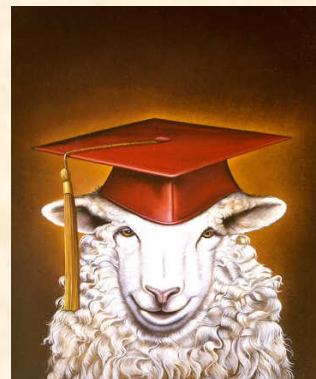

2015 NTSRI FUTURITY

The Tunis futurity has been developed to encourage and support junior Tunis exhibitors' interest in Tunis sheep. Juniors have the opportunity to purchase quality ewe lambs, and breeders have the opportunity to promote their breeding program and encourage our junior members to take a larger interest in Tunis sheep. Futurity lambs may be purchased at any advertised sale where lambs are made available to all juniors in all regions.

Consigner Rules:

1. There will be a nomination fee of \$25.00 paid by seller before the sale and is nonrefundable, even if the lamb is not purchased by a junior or if the lamb does not sell. A \$150.00 farm fee may be paid to nominate unlimited ewe lambs for that year.
2. Lambs will be identified by at least two forms of identification: private tag numbers, federal scrapes ID tag and tattoos are acceptable forms of identification. Without a federal scrapes ID tag the animal WILL NOT be eligible for this program with no exceptions allowed. If a tag is lost, contact Lacey Allen as soon as possible for direction.
3. The Ewe Lamb MUST be NTSRI registered before the sale to be eligible for the NTSRI Futurity program.

Exhibitor/Purchaser Rules:

1. All youth who have a birthdate between January 1, 1992 and January 1, 2008 are eligible to participate in the 2015 Tunis Futurity. Junior membership must be obtained during the 2015 calendar year to receive payout.
2. The Junior exhibitor must show and have control of their own lamb throughout the show to receive points. If the Junior needs assistance (i.e. in the case of physical handicap, injury, two lambs in the same class, etc.), that assistance must come from another youth. No points will be awarded for any class in which an adult shows or assists in showing a Futurity nominated lamb.
3. Any NTSRI registered Tunis ewe lamb born after September 1, 2014 may be nominated, purchased and shown as a NTSRI Futurity lamb in the 2015 season. Lambs must be shown in the proper class at each show.
4. Participating Futurity lambs must be registered in the exhibiting Junior's name only. Lambs registered under farm names, family names, partnerships, 4-H clubs, FFA chapters, etc. will not be acceptable.

5. Futurity points forms must be mailed to:

and postmarked no more than 21 days from the date of the show. After more than 21 days has elapsed, the points for that show will not be included in the final tally. Mail the original form only; no copies will be accepted. (Please keep a copy for your own records.)

6. Double points will be allowed for one class at the Junior's own state fair, or the show that is considered a region's state fair (i.e. The Big E for the New England states). If the Junior's state does not have a state fair, a state fair in a neighboring state can be attended and one class from that show tallied for double points. Juniors should participate in the Tunis breed classes if available, and may participate in All Other Breed (AOB) classes if necessary. The points form should be clearly marked to show the state fair is to be tallied as double points.

7. All Futurity forms should be postmarked and mailed to Lacey Allen on or before January 21, 2016. Results of the 2015 NTSRI Futurity will be announced at the Wooster Show and Sale in May 2016.

8. A packet containing the rules of the 2015 Futurity and blank points forms will be given to each participant when they are identified as the owner of a nominated lamb. Current rules and blank forms will also be available on the NTSRI website.

9. A Junior may purchase and show as many Futurity lambs as they would like, but will only be paid for the lamb earning the highest points during the 2015 show season. Prize money will be determined by total amount of money taken in for Futurity lamb nominations. The Futurity will pay out ten places. If fewer than ten lambs participate, the pay out of prize money will be adjusted accordingly. Prize money will be distributed prior to the 2016 National Tunis Show and Sale in Wooster, OH.

Breed Associations, Livestock Expositions, and Society

As we approach the summer show season, when many breed societies hold annual meetings and farmers feature their newest crop of lambs at national sales, it is important that livestock producers reflect on the broader goals of their associations and purebred expositions. Associations exist to improve, protect, and promote a product, and state governments and producers utilize livestock expositions to standardize these traits. But members of associations also have differences of opinions as it relates to the goals of the association as well as the ideal type of sheep that producers should select for breeding and showing.

This article addresses these two issues by examining the political role of breed societies. Of course, by politics, I do not mean the partisan and often dogmatic struggle for power that we see in Washington D.C. today, but instead I use the idea of politics as a lens to investigate *the activities of people in communities, associations, or governmental institutions who manage and negotiate differences in an effort to solve collective problems*. With this in mind, I ask you to be patient with me as we swiftly navigate an abridged two-hundred-year history of societies and expositions that were created to improve agriculture for the benefit of the cultural, economic, and political entities of the United States.

At the beginning of the nineteenth century there was a proliferation of agricultural societies in the states on the eastern seaboard. Many of the societies held annual meetings and hosted local and regional competitions. The association often received grants from state and local governments for premiums in order to encourage farmers to compete with the hopes of creating better linens and fabrics, facilitate better animal and crop husbandry practices, and to address farmers' increasing concern about the fertility of soil.

People from all walks of life engaged in these agricultural societies. Most had some vested interest in agriculture, but the stratified statuses and overall diversity of participants in the early nineteenth century is unmatched in today's livestock shows. Many high-profile statesmen, farmers, physicians, and lawyers participated, including James Madison and Thomas Jefferson. In fact, following Madison's stint as the President of the United States, he was appointed to lead the newly organized Agricultural Society of Albemarle in Virginia in October of 1817.

The vast participation in the improvement of plant crops and animals and investment by state governments in agricultural improvement reflect the deeply-held belief by this generation of farmers and politicians that the health of agriculture was directly related to the health of the American republic. Agricultural improvement societies played an important role in the development of civic skills and attitudes in the fairly fragile infant nation and addressed eminently important issues, such as soil exhaustion and breeding efficiency and consistency in animal husbandry. It was remarkable that many of the members of these early associations greatly differed ideologically on issues concerning church establishments, courts, and legislatures, yet they agreed that the health of the young political system depended on the work of these agricultural associations.

A century later, just like these early agricultural societies, purebred livestock societies built on this tradition with the intention of improving the competitiveness of livestock in a changing American cultural and political landscape. Following the Spanish-American War, Chicago businessmen, livestock producers, and American politicians argued that the ascendance of the United States as a world power in the twentieth century as well as the development of the agricultural sector to compete in the modern-industrial economy required the transformation of animal husbandry and the trading of animal genetics between British and American farmers. In 1900, a group of political actors, including farmers, university professors, and meatpackers, founded the International Livestock Exposition in Chicago (the International) to encourage and demonstrate the breeding of the “most competitive” animals in the world. Leading up to the Great War, the International was a hotbed of political conversations; the Saddle and Sirloin Club welcomed top political officials not only from Washington D.C. but also from Japan, Britain, Canada, and Argentina. These nations, along with the United States, were interested in the role of livestock, as the basis of food security, in projecting power in the international arena in terms of military and economic competition. And, it was the business side of this equation that interested the Union Stockyards in Chicago, the host site of the International. The meatpacking interests in Chicago used this self-created opportunity to impact the type of animal raised by livestock producers for the meatpackers’ own economic purposes.

While this article provides the reader a mere snapshot of the political and cultural connections of livestock expositions to the larger American experience, it is important for all members of livestock associations to consider the often subtle or covert civic function of our activities. Of course, I am not arguing that the Tunis breed associations need to address foreign policy at annual meetings, but it is important to consider the context of our experience as livestock producers. And, in this regard, we should consider our function within our broader communities and remember that county and state fairs as well as national expositions are the primary lens and medium for the public, including consumers and policymakers, to experience the workings of purebred livestock associations and producers.

Also, the types of sheep we produce, the priorities we create for selective breeding that are influenced by the judges we elect, reflect our preferences as breed associations. I am often asked what type of sheep a particular judge prefers, but we rarely ask bigger, more pressing questions about our priorities for selective breeding. Breeders should figure out the type of sheep that works best for them in terms of on-the-farm performance, as well as what type of sheep fits their marketing goals, a topic that will be explored in more detail in the forthcoming article.

But what becomes apparent is that breed associations have to negotiate two potentially conflicting operations. On one hand, livestock associations exist to improve existing animal husbandry techniques and promote a product, which requires a certain degree of standardization of selective breeding preferences and some agreed upon goals. On the other hand, breed associations were intended to promote a civic conversation that includes differences of opinions and experiences. And, in this vein, as we prepare for summer activities, we should ask ourselves if our Tunis breed associations can promote a product and encourage the improvement of the breed while embracing the seemingly noble task of managing a diverse membership.

It is my opinion, based on a survey of historical data, that the promotion of different types of sheep and perspectives underneath the umbrella of a breed society can strengthen, not weaken, our ability to market our ideas to new clients and expand the “Tunis brand.” My conclusion is based on the central premise that agricultural societies were established to contribute to the betterment of agriculture and to encourage healthy civic conversations that helps develop public skills and virtues. Associations have the potential to facilitate the commingling of ideas among a plurality of people, who possess differences of opinions, experiences, and goals, in order to sustain a democratic society based on a well-functioning agricultural sector.

THE FUTURE OF NATIOANL TUNIS SHOW

I propose that the National Tunis Show be held at the North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE) in Louisville, Kentucky each year. I understand that the National will be held at Eastern States Exposition in 2015 and at NAILE in 2016. I'm told the process involved to make this change will take time. However, if we begin now, the change could take effect by 2017. There are several very good reasons for making this change, and I will share them with you.

First, Louisville, KY is somewhat centrally located for most Tunis breeders across the country. When the National Tunis Show is on the east coast, it is very difficult and often cost prohibitive for Tunis breeders in the western part of the United States to attend. Adversely, if the National Tunis Show were held on the west coast, Tunis breeders from the East would have the same difficulty participating.

Second, because NAILE is the largest livestock exposition in the world, it draws an enormous amount of people in the sheep industry. No Tunis breeder would have to miss this event because his or her sheep fitter doesn't normally attend. There would be a larger pool of potential sheep judges available because many attend regularly. Other events can be easily coordinated at NAILE because of the facilities for a "Stars of Louisville Sale", Board of Directors meetings, youth activities etc.

Third, because NAILE is the last sheep show of the season and the largest gathering of sheep breeders, I would argue that it is definitely the most important sheep show of the year. People in the industry tend to place additional value on the show results. If a Tunis ram or ewe wins National Champion status at another sheep event and then it doesn't place first in it's class at NAILE, Tunis breeders wonder why. It makes sense that the biggest annual competition, namely the selection of the National Champion Tunis Sheep, take place at the end of the show season. Obviously, sports teams do not have their championship events in the middle of the season.

Fourth, because the Open Tunis Show at NAILE is an exhibitor-based show and entry fees collected from the exhibitors pay a large portion of the premiums, exhibitors have more flexibility to do things like select judges, influence classes on the premium list, and make suggestions for improving the show. The Open Tunis Show at NAILAE has been able to accommodate participation by both Tunis breed associations. If the National Tunis Show were held at NAILAE each year, there would be no reason to discuss separate National Tunis Shows for the various Tunis breed associations.

And finally, as the sheep industry continues to shrink across the country, and the number of people raising sheep decreases along with the number of sheep registrations, it is becoming more difficult to find venues that wish to host the National Tunis Show. I expect this trend will continue at least in the short term and probably for a number of years. Having a single, designated location for the National Tunis Show, would simplify things for everyone. Tunis Breeders would no longer have to find out where the National Tunis Show is in a given year. Event planners would have an annual schedule to deal with, and exhibitors would know what to expect.

In conclusion, I believe that holding the National Tunis Show at NAILE each year is a logical and practical change that should be implemented. In 2014, of the 21 sheep breeds that had individual show at NAILE, at least 13 were National Shows for that breed. Many of them have their National Show at NAILE every year, presumably because it works.

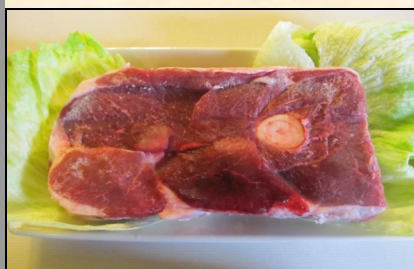
